Change in Management

- 2010 Refuge management opened Refuge public use roads to All Terrain Vehicle use.
- Analyzed and approved under 2007 Land Use Plan.
- Not implemented by previous Refuge management.
- CPNHA Board and some Members did not agree.
- Long term Volunteers and CPNHA Members left the Refuge.
- Caused a rift between CPNWR and CPNHA Board which still continues.

CPNWR/CPNHA Agreement

- From 2006 through 2014, CPNHA worked with and operated a bookstore at CPNWR through a Cooperative Agreement (CA).
- CA expired in 2011.
- Started working with CPNHA in 2013 on a new CA.
- Draft CA completed in March 2014.
- CA was never finalized.

USFWS New 'Friends Policy'

- Part 633 Friends Organization (633FW1) finalized as policy in April, 2014.
- 633FW1 provided policy, guidance, and administrative procedures for FWS to establish and work with Friends Organizations.
- 633FW1 Defined a 'Friends' as having an organizational mission of supporting the FWS service site which they are affiliated.
- Main Sticking Point CPNHA originally established to support CPNWR "and Promoting Interest in and Knowledge of the Sonoran Desert."



- Requirement to keep CPNHA Bookstore at CPNWR was signing a new Friends Partnership Agreement under 633FW1 and changing their mission to focus solely on the refuge.
- After several discussions
- Meeting with FWS R2 Friends Coordinator
- CPNHA felt they could not amend their mission to focus solely on the CPNWR as 633FW1 required and sign a Friends Partnership Agreement.

Natural History Association has rift with Fish & Wildlife

Since its beginnings some twenty years ago, Cabeza Prieta Natural History Association has served the community of Ajo through a two-part, primarily educational, mission, according to the association's executive board. The first part of the CPNHA mission has been that of providing assistance to the local wildlife refuge. This assistance has taken many forms, such as helping to enlist volunteers for the pronghom recovery project, huilding a nature trail and managing a bookstore at the visitor center, repairing facilities at the Childs Mountain overlook, and guiding Childs Mountain tours.

The second part of CPNHA's mission is reflected in services conducted as an independent organization. The following activities are just some of the ways CPNHA has been fulfilling the second part of its mission; sponsoring as many as seven free public lectures between January and March; supporting, both financially and with volunteer helpers, three Songran Symposiums; organizing projects like the removal of graffiti from the rock faces on either side of Highway 85 where it passes through the Crater Range; and conducting nature walks in the surrounding desert; along with maintaining a website at www.cabe;aprieta.org that receives three quarters of a million "hits" per year CPNHA has also been instrumental in the planning and carrying out of every Sonoran Shindig since the first of these annual festivals was held many years

CPNHA BY-LAWS AMENDED

2004

Character of Affairs: "...promotion of educational and interpretive activities of the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service, in concert with preservation of natural resources at the Cabeza Prieta National Wildlife Refuge, as well as promoting interest in, and knowledge of, the Sonoran Desert in southwestern Arizona."

2015

Character of Affairs: "The promotion of educational and interpretive activities intended to enhance understanding and appreciation of the natural history of the Sonoran Desert in southwestern Arizona and to raise concern for the preservation of this unique natural environment."

Reflections

- 2010 Decision to allow ATV use on the Refuge struck to the core values of some CPNHA Board Members.
- Set the wheels in motion to distance themselves from CPNWR. New FWS Friends Policy was the final straw.
- CPNHA Board Members rarely change, just rotate positions. Original core values are still present. (Change in By-Laws).
- Board Members seem relieved not to HAVE to work with Refuge.
